Children thoroughly enjoy their time at this setting. They feel very secure, happy, and comfortable. They play freely, are extremely contented, and happily communicate their needs. Children confidently choose toys and activities which interest them from the excellent selection available. They have very positive and affectionate bonds of attachment with the child minder and each other.

The child minder has a comprehensive range of policies in place, which promote the children's well-being. The child minder provides a nurturing and caring atmosphere and consistently meets children's needs successfully. She offers an excellent range of free play opportunities and engaging planned activities for children to access independently or with support.

The child minder ensures the environment is safe, clean, and well maintained. The premises are welcoming, homely and well organised. Detailed risk assessments and safety checks are in place. The child minder provides a wide range of engaging resources, which extend children's play and further their development.

The service is managed exceptionally well. The child minder has a beneficial range of policies and procedures which are shares with parents. Communication with parents is very effective. Links with the community are good.

Well-being Excellent

Children are very confident communicators as their wants, moods and needs are fully considered. They know that their verbal and non-verbal communication will be acted upon. Children move around confidently, exploring and following their interests. They have very good opportunities to make choices and decisions about what affects them. For example, during outdoor play they were encouraged to chose what they wanted to play with.

Children are delighted and express enthusiasm and enjoyment. Throughout their time at the setting, we saw children happy, smiling and laughing. Children confidently spoke with visitors. Their individual needs are met, and their routines are supported. They clearly have a strong sense of belonging, forming strong relationships and are very familiar with routines. For example, getting themselves ready to go to collect other children.

Interactions between children and the child minder are consistently stimulating. Children cooperate enthusiastically and feel inspired and motivated. For example, a younger child copied an older child while playing outside on the climbing frame, smiling and giggling with each other. Children confidently interact with each other and included visitors in their play, showing an exceptional sense of confidence. There is lots of play between different age groups of children, as well as with the child minder.

Children are highly motivated, animated, and fully engaged in their play and learning. We heard children mumbling to themselves as they played, and they concentrated for a good amount of time on their chosen activity. They eagerly enjoy interesting and stimulating opportunities indoors and outdoors and can choose to relax and have quiet times. Children have considerable freedom to safely explore their indoor and outdoor environment. For instance, they move confidently between rooms and around the furniture and resources safely.

Children are self-motivated to initiate their own play and to influence their tasks and activities because there is a focus on child led activities. Children take part in activities resulting in a great feeling of achievement and high self-esteem. They are enthusiastic to show or talk about what they have been doing. Children have good opportunities to develop their independence skills, enabling them to do things for themselves successfully. For instance, they were encouraged to try and put their shoes on or access resources independently before being offered support.

Care and Development

Excellent

The child minder has purposeful and thorough policies in place, which promote the children's safety and well-being. Her safeguarding training is up to date, and she has robust procedures in place to safeguard children. The child minder promotes children's health successfully and she prioritises children's well-being and safety. The child minder has clear procedures in place when taking children out in the car or collecting from school, which ensures their safety is paramount. She holds a current first aid certificate. There are good systems in place to record accidents/incidents and medication administration. Effective and robust hygiene practices are in place. The child minder encourages hand washing and she sanitises the regularly the children are supported in this practice too.

Behaviour management is a strength of the child minder. She praises children for their good behaviour and consistently encourages positive interactions. She makes up fun games to encourage children to respond positively. We saw the child minder encourage children to share appropriately with each other, calmly reminding children to take turns. The child minder engages successfully with children, whilst promoting their learning and self-esteem. For example, whilst engaging in messy play, we heard her encourage the children and praise their efforts. She models the language associated with good manners, and acts as a good role model at all times.

The child minder provides a nurturing and caring atmosphere and gives responsive care. She is aware of the children's individual development and emotional needs. She knows the children and their families exceptionally well and has a good understanding of each child's individual requirements and routine. The child minder strives to understand and communicate with the children in her care. Her interactions with the children are positive, demonstrating warmth and kindness. She looks upon the children as an extension of her own family unit. The child minder supports children in their free play, using incidental opportunities to extend discussion and learning opportunities. The child minder plays alongside children which results in children developing their imagination for sustained periods of time. Planning is thematic and the child minder tracks the children's progress effectively.

Environment Good

The child minder ensures that the environment is safe, secure, and well maintained indoors and outdoors. She has effective measures in place to ensure that she follows and implements her responsibilities in relation to the safety and welfare of children. The child minder completes effective and accurate general risk assessments, which are regularly reviewed and acted upon. She organises regular cleaning routines that reflect her good hygiene practices and her good infection control practices minimise any risks to children's health and safety. The child minder carries out regular safety checks and fire drills, with documentation made available to inspect.

The child minder ensures that the environment has good indoor and outdoor play space for children to move freely. She ensures the environment meets the needs of all children and enables most of them to reach their full potential. For instance, resources are stored at low levels, in drawers, boxes or on open shelves which allow children to access them independently. The child minder ensures that any outdoor play space is used as often as possible, and we saw the children enjoying this. The child minder organises the environment well so that it provides a good range of play opportunities suitable for the age ranges cared for. The premises are welcoming, warm, and accessible to all.

The child minder ensures that children can access good quality and a broad variety of age-appropriate furniture, toys, and equipment. These are well maintained, checked, and cleaned regularly and stored appropriately. The child minder offers resources and toys which stimulate the children's interest and imagination, ensuring there is a good balance of resources made from both plastic and natural materials. She uses displays, books, and activities to promote the Welsh language throughout the environment. There is a good-sized outdoor play area which is well maintained and presents interesting opportunities for the children.

Leadership and Management

Excellent

The child minder runs her service extremely well and exceeds the National Minimum Standards (NMS). She is very organised and keeps all the required records. A statement of purpose is in place which provide those who use the setting with an accurate reflection of the service provided. The child minder has a range of beneficial, easy to read, policies in place which she shares with parents. The child minder is suitably qualified and has a clear vision for her service. She has a strong culture of continuous personal development and has completed numerous trainings since previous inspection.

The child minder reviews and reflects upon her service and produces a purposeful quality of care report. She seeks information from parents and children to support her in the evaluation of her service and provides an opportunity to make suggestions for improvements to the service. The report looks at what works well at the setting and clearly targets areas for improvement.

The child minder promotes positive partnerships with parents and other professional child minders. She keeps parents up to date regularly through verbal, private messages, and social media posts. The child minder makes good use of her local community and environment engaging in interesting and stimulating trips which will benefit the children's development and learning. For example, using the local park and rural walks.
