Children are happy and settled. Their opinions are valued and acted on. They cope well with separation from their parents / carers because they are warmly welcomed by staff. Children are active and enjoy making choices about what they want to play with. Interactions between children and those caring for them are positive and as a result children enjoy their activities. They are developing their independence skills successfully. Staff have a friendly approach to care giving. They praise children for their efforts and achievements. Play activities are well organised supporting children to develop their physical skills well. Staff promote most healthy practices effectively. The indoor environment is clean and organised attractively. The outdoor environment offers good opportunities for children to practice their co-ordination skills. Toys, resources and equipment are age appropriate and suitable for the ages cared for. The people running the setting have made significant improvements and are committed to create better outcomes for children. The setting operates bi-lingually.

Well-being Good

Children are content and express enjoyment. They have a sense of belonging, are beginning to form friendships and are becoming familiar with routines.

Children are confident communicators as their wants, moods and needs are generally considered. For instance, before going to school a child made a request to sit in the front seat of the car and their request was accepted. A child said excitedly they like coming to the setting to paint and play with the toy ponies and unicorns. Children spoke to us about the ice lollies they had after playing outside in the sunshine and said the 'rocket' tasted 'nice'.

Children cope well with separation from their parents / carers because the friendly staff warmly welcome them. They are familiar with the daily routine and show us how they wash and dry their hands and put the paper towel in the bin provided. Children feel comfortable and approach staff with ease to make their requests, for example, during breakfast time they asked for more cereal, milk or water to drink and this was given to them straight away.

Children interact positively, many children co-operate well and are generally interested and engaged. They enjoy the social occasion of mealtimes; they sit nicely at the table and are well mannered. Children are forming friendships and are learning to take turns and share. For instance, during outdoor play two friends took turns to ride down the ramp on their bikes. Younger children enjoyed giving their friend a cuddle.

Children are active and curious. They enjoy appropriate opportunities indoors and outdoors and can also relax and have quiet times. For example, younger children enjoyed exploring the different sized coloured balls, they held up their favourite ball to show staff. Other children worked well as a team, they built a wooden train track and helped one another to place the carriages on the track. They experimented with speed and motion, seeing how fast the carriages can move. Few children enjoy quiet time and chose a book to look and read through with staff. They actively pointed at the pictures and asked and answered questions.

Younger children show perseverance and determination to climb the slide steps and took delight in their own achievements by repeating the exercise. Children prepare themselves to go to school well and make sure they have everything they need ready. Younger children have good skills to self-feed and enjoy eating their lunch. Children are learning to do things for themselves with positive encouragement from the staff.

Care and Development

Good

Staff have a friendly, caring approach and manage interactions positively. They praise children for their efforts and achievements.

Staff understand their role and responsibilities to keep children safe and healthy. Reasonable measures are taken to minimise risks of harm to children's welfare and safety. They have an appropriate understanding of safeguarding procedures. Nearly all staff have completed first aid and safeguarding training suitable for the age ranges of the children being cared for. Accidents and incidents are recorded accurately, and these are signed by both staff and parent to evidence they are being kept informed. Parents we spoke with said staff provide them with daily updates on how their child has been during the day and if there has been an accident, they are fully informed.

Staff promote healthy lifestyles effectively. For example, they follow good hygiene procedures and encourage children to wash their hands, helping to develop their personal hygiene practice effectively. Healthy snacks are provided with a choice of milk or water to drink. However, during lunch time diluted fruit juice is served for older children which is not in line with current guidance. Since our visit the responsible individual has confirmed she has addressed this matter. Staff encourage children to play outdoors in the fresh air to develop their physical skills well. They make sure children are prepared to go out and play safely in hot sunny weather, for instance, ensuring they have sun cream and hats.

Staff consistently record children and their own attendance but not always recording their own breaks. Fire drills are conducted, and the outcome is recorded. Nappy changing procedures are in line with current guidance.

Staff praise children for their efforts positively. They provide a friendly and welcoming environment and make sure children are provided with reassurance and comfort. This creates a calm and relaxed atmosphere.

Staff have a responsive approach to activity planning and focus on children directing their own play well but miss opportunities sometimes to develop the children's learning. They track children's progress but the outcome and evaluation from these observations are not always fully considered to aid the next steps for each child's progression. Activities to teach children about their wider society and Welsh heritage is underdeveloped. Staff are consistently engaging with children during their activities, for instance, a staff member held a child's hand to walk down the steps and took this opportunity to practice counting. They encourage children to engage with the local community to improve their social skills, for example, photographs showed children enjoying a variety of activities at the local library and collecting leaves during a walk.

Environment Good

The people running the setting have made significant improvements to the indoor and outdoor environments. They have worked hard to make sure these areas are attractively organised and well ventilated.

The people running the setting provide a safe and clean environment where children can play successfully.

Risk assessments appropriately identify the potential hazards to children and what measures are in place to manage these risks. Since COVID-19 the person in charge makes sure staff increase the cleaning routines and follow current guidance. Information is available to everyone about how they will deal with emergencies. Staff supervise children well.

The people running the setting make sure the layout of the playroom promotes children's independence enabling them to freely explore and make their own choices about what they want to play with. Toys and resources are suitable for the ages cared for and children have access to appropriately sized furniture.

The people running the setting ensure children have easy access to toys and resources. There are resources to develop children's sensory, language, numeracy and self-awareness skills. However, the use of recycled and sustainable resources is underdeveloped in order to further develop children's sensory skills and curiosity. Leaders make sure there is a designated area for children's personal items, and this creates a sense of belonging. They present children's artwork nicely and this shows children their efforts are valued. For instance, seaside themed paintings of fishes, sandcastles, star fish and paper plate jelly fishes decorate the play areas.

The outdoor area is attractively organised with a choice of equipment for children to choose from and develop their physical and co-ordination skills. The people running the setting make sure children have some opportunity to learn about the natural world and have organised areas in order for children to plant flowers.

Leadership and Management

Good

The people running the setting are committed to making improvements and manage the setting well.

The statement of purpose provides parents with the information about what the setting offers. Policies and procedures are in place, and these are implemented appropriately and reviewed regularly, however the most recent review date is not always included. The responsible individual has submitted the assessment of service statement to CIW and notify us of any significant events at the setting. The people running the setting have a good understanding of their responsibility to promote the Welsh language and the 'Active Offer' is provided.

The report reviewing the quality of care is reflective, highlighting what the setting does well and what requires further development. The report includes some of the comments gathered from those using the setting to aid improvements going forward in order to achieve better outcomes for children.

The people running the setting make sure the disclosure and barring checks for staff and their mandatory training is up to date. The required information has been collated in the staff and children's files. Discussions of one-to-one supervision and appraisals with staff are recorded. However, these do not always capture the performance targets for each staff member fully in order to improve their practice. Staff told us the people running the setting are 'supportive' and always available if needed. Staff spoken to said they felt supported in their role and enjoy working at the setting.

Parents we spoke to said how happy they are with the setting and their child is happy and settled. The people running the setting have built positive partnerships with parents and the local community. Such positive experiences are helping children to familiarise with their local surroundings and improve their social skills.

Recommendations to meet with the National Minimum Standards

- R1: Follow the Welsh Government food and nutrition guidance for childcare providers on healthy hydration.
- R2: Develop staff's knowledge and practice on how to progress children's learning, for example, consider using the observations made on children's progress to prepare activities for their next steps in learning.
- R3: Include the use of recycled and sustainable resources to develop children's sensory skills and curiosity.
